> \$274,000 in 2019-20 out of a \$7 million total spend to replace the centre to support the provision of quality and safe services. Part of the Rural and Regional Infrastructure Package.

3 Torres Strait Islands seawalls and coastal inundation mitigation upgrades



Thursday Island Splash Park

\$2.5 million in 2019-20 out of a \$4.1 million total spend to build a splash park on Thursday Island, contributing to positive recreation activities and community connections for families and young people.

5 Torres Shire water treatment infrastructure upgrade

\$4.8 million in 2019-20 out of a \$12 million total spend to upgrade drinking water treatment infrastructure including construction of a water filtration plant on Horn Island and improvements to the drinking water network on Thursday Island.

Thursday Island community centre

\$2.5 million in 2019-20 out of a \$4.9 million total spend to construct the centre.

7 Thursday Island Health Facility Upgrade Project

\$1.5 million in 2019-20 out of a \$36 million total spend to upgrade current health facilities to align with contemporary models of care and the unique cultural consideration of the Torres Strait Islander community. Part of the Advancing Queensland's Health Infrastructure Program.

8 Northern Peninsula Area water supply system

\$2.7 million in 2019-20 to undertake important repairs to the systems reservoirs.

9 Indigenous Land and Sea Ranger Program

> \$360,000 in 2019-20 to protect environmental and Indigenous cultural heritage values in Mapoon, as part of the \$12 million 2019-20 Queensland Indigenous Land and Sea Ranger Program.

Weipa new Queensland Fire and Emergency Services centre

> \$800,000 in 2019-20 out of a \$1.2 million total spend to provide an emergency and disaster centre.

Peninsula Developmental Road (Coen to Weipa)

\$14.5 million in 2019-20 out of a \$20.5 million total spend (stage 2) to pave and seal sections between Telecom Tower and Archer River. Part of the Cape York Region Package, delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.

Pormpuraaw police facility

\$4.9 million in 2019-20 out of a \$8.2 million total spend to deliver a replacement facility.

Mission Beach

Rinyirru (Lakefield) National Park (Cape York Peninsula Aboriginal Land) - Catfish Waterhole day use area

\$150,000 in 2019-20 out of a \$160,000 total spend for construction of day use area and carpark.

Mossman Mill bio-refinery

up to \$25 million total spend to Far Northern Milling Pty Ltd to assist in the establishment of a bio-refinery to underpin the future of the Mossman sugar mill.

15 Mossman Hospital

\$9.6 million in 2019-20 out of a \$10.1 million total spend to redesign, refurbish and remodel the emergency department and other upgrades.

16 Tropical North Learning Academy - Trinity Beach State School

\$10.5 million in 2019-20 for refurbishment and upgrade works.

17 Smithfield Bypass

\$46.3 million in 2019-20 out of a \$152 million total spend to construct bypass route continuity on the Captain Cook Highway between McGregor Road roundabout and Caravonica roundabout. Part of the State Infrastructure Fund.

Cairns Western
Arterial Road

\$100,000 in 2019-20 out of a \$12.5 million total spend to undertake planning to upgrade the road to four lanes between Redlynch Connection Road to Captain Cook Highway.

19 Redlynch State College \$2.1 million in 2019-20 out of

an \$8.4 million total spend to construct a new building with two general learning spaces and five specialist spaces.

Whitfield State School \$500,000 in 2019-20 to construct a new playground.

21 Cairns Hospital

\$10.5 million in 2019-20 out of a \$86.4 million total spend to construct a new mental health facility, a state-of-theart hybrid operating theatre, and various upgrades.

Cairns shipping development project

\$70.1 million in 2019-20 out of a \$127.6 million total spend for dredging of Trinity Inlet shipping channel to facilitate cruise ship growth.

23 Cairns Convention Centre

The Queensland Government has committed \$176 million towards refurbishing and expanding the Cairns Convention Centre, subject to a business case. Major works are planned to coincide with the planned closure of the centre in 2020 and ensure the expanded Centre provides capacity and facilities to remain a world class facility.

Good Money Store - Cairns \$525,000 in 2019-20 out of a \$2.8 million total spend to support the store's operation. To be delivered in partnership with Good Shepherd and National Australia Bank. Part of the Better Budgeting initiative.

25 Bruce Highway, Cairns Southern Access Corridor

\$30.3 million in 2019-20 out of a \$104.1 million total spend (stage 4) to widen the highway from four to six lanes from Kate Street to Aumuller Street. Part of the Bruce Highway Upgrade Program, delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.



Mareeba Hospital new CT scanner

\$3.5 million in 2019-20 out of a \$5 million total spend for a CT scanner.



\$9.1 million in 2019-20 out of a \$12.9 million total spend for a facility for critical care in the event of a natural disaster and general community health services. Part of the Advancing Queensland Health Infrastructure Program.

28 Bruce Highway, Cairns Southern Access Corridor

\$37.9 million in 2019-20 out of a \$481 million total spend (stage 3) to duplicate the highway from two to four lanes between Edmonton and Gordonvale. Part of the Bruce Highway Upgrade Program, delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.



\$5.1 million in 2019-20 out of a \$7.5 million total spend to widen and seal the pavement between Chillagoe and Almaden. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.



\$13.6 million in 2019-20 out of a \$70 million total spend to redevelop Atherton Hospital, including the emergency department, operating theatres, Community Allied and Mental Health Building, and a new Clinical Services Building. Part of the Advancing Queensland's Health Infrastructure Program.

Malanda Swimming Club Inc.

\$153,801 in 2019-20 out of a \$289,100 total spend to upgrade amenities. Part of the Female Facilities Program.

32 Tully Hospital

\$3.1 million in 2019-20 out of a \$4.2 million total spend to redesign the current emergency department area to enable safer treatment spaces. Part of the Priority Capital Program.

Cape York Peninsula Joint Management Program

\$7.5 million in 2019-20 out of a \$15.6 million total spend for the continuation of the Cape York Tenure Resolution program.







\$24.9 million in 2019-20 out of a \$25 million total spend to help industry rejuvenate the Great Barrier Reef Island resorts and offer world-class experiences to visitors.



Panama Disease Tropical Race 4 Program

\$12.1 million over five years to control and contain the Panama Tropical Race 4 (TR4) disease which aims to incorporate a strong, robust industry model that shares the responsibility of managing this disease.



Remote Indigenous Housing



\$228.3 million in 2019-20 to support better housing outcomes for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people living in remote and discrete communities statewide, including construction of new dwellings. Includes the Indigenous Home Ownership Program and Indigenous Community Housing Organisation Transition Project. Includes funding under the National Partnership on Remote Housing.

Ecotourism boost for Far North

The Palaszczuk Government has committed \$2.9 million in 2019-20 out of a \$5.7 million total spend to complete the seven-kilometre Mowbray North component of the Wangetti Trail, stretching from the Mowbray River to Port Douglas.

The 94-kilometre Wangetti Trail will be a leading adventure based ecotourism experience through the stunning coastal and hinterland scenery of the Wet Tropics and the Great Barrier Reef World Heritage Areas.

Local and international visitors will be able to enjoy a five-night walking or a two-night mountain bike adventure, public campsites and privately-operated luxury eco-accommodation. Adventure and natured based tourism is the fastest growing tourism sector in Queensland and the Wangetti Trail is set become of the centrepiece of ecotourism for our State.

Construction and operation of the \$41.4 million Wangetti Trail will create approximately 75 jobs during construction and 150 jobs once operational with a focus on employment for Traditional Owners. It is expected to generate \$10.5 million per year for the Far North Queensland economy.

The trail has strong support from the local Yirrganydji and the Eastern Kuku Yalanji People. The Government is working with Traditional Owners to create multi-generational business opportunities on the trail.

Cairns Performing Arts Centre

The new Cairns Performing Arts Centre has brought worldclass performances from leading national and international companies to Far North Queensland since its opening in late 2018.

The Palaszczuk Government provided \$15 million to the \$71.1 million Cairns Regional Council development as part of its commitment to improving regional arts infrastructure and access.

Cairns Performing Arts Centre provides a 940-seat theatre as well as 400-seat black box theatre – more than double the capacity of the Cairns Civic Centre it replaced.

Construction of the new centre created local jobs, with 90 per cent of total works and materials supplied by local businesses and 95 per cent of trade contracts going to local companies.

Payroll Tax Package

\$885 million of targeted payroll tax initiatives to support business and create employment, including:

- an increase to the payroll tax free threshold for small business from \$1.1 million to \$1.3 million
- a discount of 1 percentage point on the relevant payroll tax rate for employers with more than 85% of their employees residing outside SEQ
- a rebate for taking on additional full-time employees of up to \$20,000
- an extension of the 50% payroll tax rebate for businesses that employ apprentices and trainees.


Backing Queensland Jobs

Queensland's diversified economy provides a unique business environment that places the State ahead of the pack. The Palaszczuk Government continues to work with and support businesses to create employment opportunities and community prosperity.


- \$12.9 billion capital works program to directly support 40,500 jobs across Queensland in 2019-20.
- ♦ \$2.7 billion to support safe, secure, reliable and costeffective energy and water, and to enhance the productive capacity of businesses, industries and communities.
- \$2.4 billion police operating budget as well as \$69.8 million capital for new, upgraded and replacement police facilities, including \$28 million to continue work on the \$52.2 million Counter-Terrorism and Community Safety Training Centre at Wacol.
- + \$1.2 billion education portfolio capital program, including new schools, education facilities, and refurbishments.
- \$777.7 million for health infrastructure to support service delivery.
- + \$479.3 million for new social housing and upgrades.
- \$254 million in joint funding with the Australian Government for additional natural disaster recovery packages.

- \$250 million to CleanCo for new renewable energy generation, creating more jobs on top of the 4000 Queensland jobs in the solar, wind and hydro sectors.
- \$420 million towards Skilling Queenslanders for Work, to help eligible Queenslanders get the skills, qualifications and direct assistance they need to enter and stay in the workforce.
- From joint commitments totalling \$39 million for business and industry. the Queensland and Australian governments will provide a \$22 million Beef Recovery Package, to tackle devastation from the North and Far North Queensland monsoon trough. The Oueensland Rural and Industry Development Authority will administer Australian Government funding of \$300 million over three years to assist primary producers and their stock get back on their feet.
