The Queensland Budget will directly support Brisbane and Redlands with significant expenditure in 2021-22 including:

Infrastructure

\$4.1B

for productivity-enhancing infrastructure and capital works, estimated to support around

11,700 jobs

in this region.

for the Metro North, Metro South and Children's Health Hospitals and Health Services.

Education

\$309.6M

to maintain, improve and upgrade schools in Brisbane and Redlands.

1 Brighton Health Campus
\$888,351 in 2021-22 out of a \$4 million total spend for construction projects to improve facilities at the Brighton Health Campus.

2 Gateway Motorway, Bracken Ridge to Pine River upgrade, funding commitment
\$3.6 million in 2021-22 out of a \$1 billion total spend towards planning for six lanes on the Gateway Motorway from Bracken Ridge to Pine River. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.

3 Bald Hills State School
\$800,000 in 2021-22 out of a \$1 million total spend to upgrade the administration area.

4 Beams Road (Carseldine and Fitzgibbon), rail level crossing funding commitment
\$17 million in 2021-22 out of a \$163 million total spend towards an overpass upgrade to the rail level crossing. Project cost, timing and funding arrangements subject to further negotiations with Brisbane City Council. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.

5 Carseldine Urban Village
\$10.6 million in 2021-22 out of a \$39.2 million total spend to deliver an urban village at the former QUT campus that retains existing bushland and provides new spaces for residential, commercial and retail activities.

6 Advanced energy management system replacement
\$7.3 million in 2021-22 out of a \$50.4 million total spend to replace the energy management system to ensure continuing effective management of the transmission network in real time.

7 The Prince Charles Hospital
\$4.7 million in 2021-22 out of a \$91.3 million total spend for construction projects to improve facilities at the Prince Charles Hospital site, including a new carpark.

8 Renewable Energy Training Facility
\$3 million in 2021-22 out of a \$17 million total spend to establish a state of the art Renewable Energy Training Facility.

12 Newstead House Restoration
\$3.8 million in 2021-22 out of a \$5.5 million total spend to undertake conservation works of Newstead House and heritage listed Substation.

13 Lindum train station
\$497,490 in 2021-22 out of a \$35.2 million total spend to upgrade Lindum train station to provide improved access and facilities.

14 The Gap State High School
\$6.1 million in 2021-22 out of a \$12.3 million total spend to construct a new building for additional learning spaces.

18 Balmoral State High School
\$15.8 million in 2021-22 out of a \$16.3 million total spend to construct a new building for additional learning spaces and to upgrade the administration building.

19 Cannon Hill train station
\$8 million in 2021-22 out of a \$26.7 million total spend to upgrade Cannon Hill train station to provide improved access and facilities.

20 Cross River Rail
\$1.517 billion in 2021-22 out of a \$6.888 billion total spend to continue delivery of the Cross River Rail Project.

21 New Performing Arts Venue at QPAC
\$84.2 million in 2021-22 out of a \$175 million total spend to build the New Performing Arts Venue at the Queensland Performing Arts Centre.

22 West End State School
\$21.2 million in 2021-22 out of a \$30.9 million total spend for the second stage of the redevelopment of the school.

23 Defence CRC
\$11.5 million in 2021-22 out of a \$65 million total spend for establishment and operation of the Defence Cooperative Research Centre for Trusted Autonomous Systems in Queensland. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.

9 Oakleigh State School
\$280,000 in 2021-22 out of a \$5 million total spend to deliver a new hall facility.

10 Northshore Hamilton 2021-22 Capital Works Program
\$29.5 million in 2021-22 out of a \$363.6 million total spend for urban renewal development in Queensland's largest waterfront project.

11 Ballymore Precinct Redevelopment
\$15 million in 2021-22 towards the redevelopment of the Ballymore Stadium in Herston to create a new Queensland Rugby Union high-performance centre.

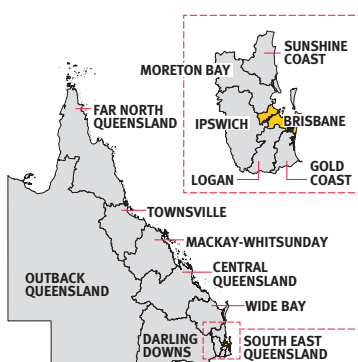
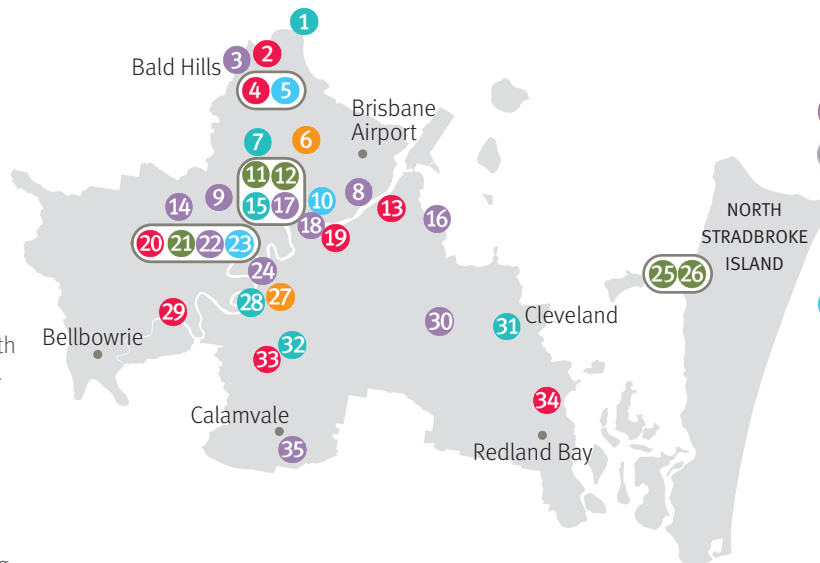
15 Royal Brisbane and Women's Hospital
\$5.4 million in 2021-22 out of a \$24.3 million total spend for construction projects to improve facilities at the Royal Brisbane and Women's Hospital site.

16 Darling Point Special School
\$6 million in 2021-22 out of a \$14 million total spend to construct a new building for additional learning spaces.

17 Fortitude Valley State Secondary College
\$31.2 million in 2021-22 out of a \$130 million total spend to construct a new secondary school.

24 Brisbane South State Secondary College
\$11.5 million in 2021-22 out of a \$145.7 million total spend to construct a new secondary school and to develop Stage 1 of the sports fields.

25 Quandamooka Art Museum and Performance Institute
\$973,391 in 2021-22 out of a \$12.6 million total spend for a gallery, museum, performance and event hosting centre on Minjerribah (North Stradbroke Island). Part of the Minjerribah Futures program.



26 Yalingbila Bibula (Whale on the Hill)

\$3.1 million in 2021-22 out of a \$3.6 million total spend for a whale exhibit and research pod at Mulumba (Point Lookout) on Minjerribah (North Stradbroke Island).

27 Greenslopes Energex depot development

\$17.5 million in 2021-22 out of a \$31.8 million total spend to redevelop the depot to improve network performance.

28 Yeronga Child and Youth Community Hub

\$500,000 in 2021-22 out of a \$7.8 million total spend for the establishment of a new integrated Child and Youth Community Hub to provide appropriate integrated child, youth and family services.

29 Centenary Bridge Upgrade

\$18.7 million in 2021-22 out of a \$244 million total spend towards the upgrade of the Centenary Bridge at Jindalee. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.

30 Capalaba State College

\$4.1 million in 2021-22 out of a \$8 million total spend to deliver a new hall facility.

31 Redland Hospital

\$53.4 million in 2021-22 out of a \$136.4 million total spend for construction projects to improve facilities at the Redland Hospital site, including expansion of the Hospital and a new multi-storey carpark. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.

32 Queen Elizabeth II Jubilee Hospital

\$22.4 million in 2021-22 out of a \$29.6 million total spend for construction projects to improve facilities at the Queen Elizabeth II Jubilee Hospital site.

33 Boundary Road (Coopers Plains), rail level crossing funding commitment

\$5.7 million in 2021-22 out of a \$146 million total spend towards upgrading the rail level crossing to reduce congestion and safety concerns. Project cost, timing and funding arrangements subject to further planning. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.

34 Cleveland - Redland Bay Road (Cleveland), Anita Street to Magnolia Parade, duplicate to four lanes

\$14.6 million in 2021-22 out of a \$97 million total spend to upgrade intersections on Cleveland - Redland Bay Road at Anita Street and duplicate the road between Magnolia Parade and Benfer Road.

35 Stretton State College

\$8.4 million in 2021-22 out of a \$10.9 million total spend to construct a new building for additional learning spaces.

36 Redland Satellite Hospital

Part of the \$265 million total spend for delivery of seven Satellite Hospitals to manage demand and capacity while continuing to safely manage patients via alternative models of care.

Building Brisbane South State Secondary College

The new Brisbane South State Secondary College in Dutton Park is being delivered by the Queensland Government's Building Future Schools (BFS) program.

Construction of the new school commenced in November 2019 and will continue through until late 2021, supporting more than 450 local jobs. The new school welcomed its first intake of Year 7 students in Term 1, 2021 and will continue to grow each year until 2026. The school features specialised facilities for science, technology, engineering, arts and mathematics (STEAM), communication, humanities and social sciences. These facilities surround a 'learning oasis' at the heart of the campus, which provides outdoor and green space for learning and interaction.

The \$2.6 billion BFS program is delivering new state schools in Queensland's fastest growing communities to provide new and innovative education facilities for families and children within their local area.

Over \$500M for station upgrades

The Queensland Government's half-a-billion-dollar investment in its train station accessibility program is making public transport more accessible across South East Queensland, while estimated to support approximately 250 jobs.

Across the Brisbane and Redlands region, Albion, Auchenflower, Cannon Hill, Buranda, Banyo, Woolloowin, Morningside and Lindum stations are at various stages from planning and design through to construction.

Accessibility upgrades may include new or improved pedestrian footbridges, lifts, and platform raising. Other project features include accessible station facilities such as toilets, new hearing aid loops, tactile ground surface indicators, improved station finishes, customer information screens, upgraded security, lighting and station signage.

To ensure accessibility for all Queenslanders, the government is seeking expert advice from the new independent Queensland Accessible Transport Advisory Council which provides a voice for those with vision, hearing, physical or cognitive impairments as well as older people, parents with prams and youth groups.

Tax relief package

The government provided significant tax relief to support Queensland businesses, landlords, tenants, pubs and clubs, including:

- payroll tax refunds, waivers and deferrals for eligible businesses, targeted at small to medium businesses
- a payroll tax exemption for wages subsidised by the JobKeeper payment
- land tax rebates, waivers and deferrals for eligible taxpayers.

An estimated 2,820 employers in Brisbane and Redlands will also benefit in 2021-22 from the higher payroll tax threshold.

STATEWIDE HIGHLIGHTS

The Queensland Government's Economic Recovery Plan continues to support businesses, workers, families and communities across the state. Our success in managing the health challenges imposed by the COVID-19 pandemic means the state's **\$360 billion** economy has begun to recover sooner and is stronger than the rest of Australia.

2021-22 Budget highlights include:

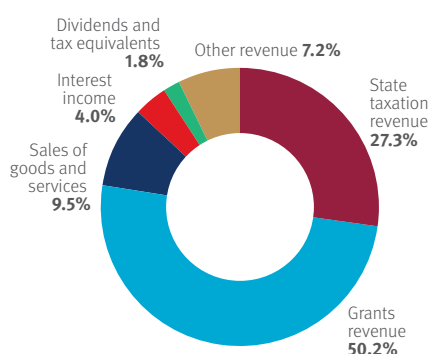
- Record health investment of **\$22.2 billion** will continue to provide a world-class health system, which is also critical to effectively manage the ongoing risks of COVID-19.
- The new **\$3.34 billion** Queensland Jobs Fund focuses on investment attraction and industry development to attract the investment needed to drive ongoing growth, and provide wider economic and employment benefits.
- The **\$52.2 billion** capital program over the forward estimates will help create many thousands of ongoing jobs, including an estimated **46,500** direct jobs in 2021-22.
- **\$460 million** toward targeted investments in flagship skills and training and employment programs Skilling Queenslanders for Work and a revitalised Back to Work program.

Ten new schools

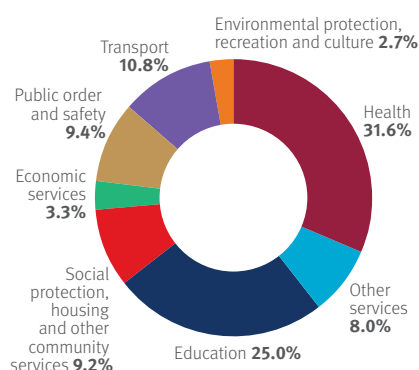
The 2021-22 Budget includes \$913.7 million for 10 new schools to open in 2023 and 2024, as part of the Building Future Schools Program.

- 2023 – primary schools in Yarrabilba, Ripley and the Augustine Heights/Redbank Plains area, and a secondary school in Palmview
- 2024 – primary schools in Redland Bay, Bellbird Park and the Logan Reserve/Crestmead/Park Ridge area, and secondary schools in Springfield and the Collingwood Park/Redbank Plains and Logan Reserve/Park Ridge areas.
