The Queensland Budget will directly support job creation in the Central Queensland region with significant expenditure including:



\$12 million in 2020-21 out of a \$21.3 million total spend to widen pavement on the Bruce Highway between Neilsen Avenue - Plentiful Creek. Part of the Bruce Highway Upgrade Program. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.



Rockhampton Drug Rehabilitation and **Treatment Facility**

> \$4.9 million in 2020-21 out of a \$9.5 million total spend for a new 42-bed residential alcohol and other drug rehabilitation and treatment facility in Rockhampton. Part of the Action on Ice Strategy.

Rockhampton Northern Access Upgrade

> \$20.8 million in 2020-21 out of a \$158 million total spend to upgrade and widen the Bruce Highway to four lanes between Rockhampton-Yeppoon intersection and Ramsay Creek north of Rockhampton. Part of the Bruce Highway Upgrade Program. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.

New Rockhampton Art Gallery

> \$2 million in 2020-21 out of a \$31.5 million total spend to provide funding to the Rockhampton Regional Council for the construction of the new Rockhampton Art Gallery. Part of the Building our Regions Program.

Rockhampton Hospital

\$8.4 million in 2020-21 out of a \$24.2 million total spend for construction projects to improve facilities at the Rockhampton Hospital site, including an expansion of the Mental Health Ward.

Curtis Island National Park multi use trails development

Bruce Highway (Gladstone - Rockhampton) - prioritise upgrades including dual laning

\$473,480 in 2020-21 out of a \$1.2 million total spend to upgrade the Yarwun Wastewater Treatment Plant to improve effluent quality, re-use the treated water efficiently and comply with environmental approvals. Part of the Building our Regions Program.



Browne Park Redevelopment to kick goals

The Queensland Government has earmarked funding of \$25 million to deliver the stage 1 redevelopment of Browne Park in Rockhampton, estimated to support 60 local jobs over an 18 month construction period. This important venue has been the home of rugby league in Central Queensland for more than 100 years.

The redevelopment includes replacing the existing Jack Crow stand with one that can accommodate around 4,000 seats, subject to detailed design and costings. The site includes the Rockhampton Leagues Club and the upgrades will support female participation with dedicated women's facilities.

The Browne Park redevelopment will deliver community benefits by encouraging participation in sport. It will also support the Central Queensland regional economy by attracting sporting events and visitors to the area, enhancing its reputation as a host destination.

Advanced Technology and Innovation Centre, Central Queensland University

Investing in Rockhampton's future

A new \$2.8 million Advanced Technology and Innovation Centre (ATIC) at Central Queensland University opened in September 2020, providing opportunities for Central Queenslanders to expand their career options and generate new business opportunities, resulting in more jobs for the region.

The Queensland Government delivered the new centre in partnership with Central Queensland University – a key project that supports the State's economic recovery strategy. The new centre provides opportunities for the community, local businesses, industry and students to use the space and equipment to access training and advice, make connections with others and catalyse new innovations.

The centre focuses on agtech, manufacturing innovations, engineering, communications technology and design, and will enable the local community to develop skills in high demand specialised fields. ATIC is open to the community, industry and schools to trial new business ventures, experiment with contemporary technologies and explore new careers.

Tax Relief Package

The Government provided significant tax relief to support Queensland businesses, landlords, tenants, pubs and clubs, including:

- Payroll tax refunds, waivers and deferrals for eligible businesses, targeted at small to medium businesses
- A payroll tax exemption for wages subsidised by the JobKeeper payment
- Land tax rebates, waivers and deferrals for eligible taxpayers.

An estimated 270 businesses in Central Queensland will also benefit in 2020-21 from the higher payroll tax threshold.


STATEWIDE HIGHLIGHTS

This Budget is focused on creating jobs and getting our economy moving sooner. Initiatives include:


- Driving the largest infrastructure program in over a decade \$14.8 billion in 2020–21, directly supporting 46,000 jobs. Around 58% of the capital program and 28,700 of the jobs supported will be outside the Greater Brisbane area.
- Enhancing frontline services.
 The Budget will support funding for additional frontline health staff including 5,800 nurses, 1,500 doctors and 1,700 allied health professionals through to 2024.
- Backing small businesses
 to support jobs and
 communities. More than
 \$7 billion in COVID-19
 stimulus measures have been
 provided so far, including
 reducing business costs
 through payroll tax relief and
 other tax relief measures,
 and accelerating projects
 to unlock development and
 increase economic activity.
- Increasing investment in manufacturing including \$1 billion to make trains again in Queensland.

- Growing our regions and supporting key industries such as tourism, agriculture and mining. An additional \$200 million will be provided to the Works for Queensland program to support local governments outside South East Queensland.
- Providing more Queenslanders with access to the skills and training they need for rewarding careers. \$100 million has been provided over three years to upgrade TAFE campuses.
- Providing concessions and easing the cost of living, with an estimated \$6.3 billion in 2020–21 in targeted discounts, fee waivers, rebates, and subsidies.
- Protecting the environment.
 The Great Barrier Reef will benefit from an additional \$40 million worth of support. This includes \$10 million for a Reef Assist Program and \$6 million over four years for the GBR Island Arks project to deliver ecotourism in the region.
- Delivering lower debt than New South Wales and Victoria.
