The Queensland Budget will directly support job creation in the Gold Coast region with significant expenditure including:

for productivity-enhancing infrastructure and capital works, estimated to support around **3,500 jobs** in this region in 2020-21.

Southport Ambulance Station

\$749,000 in 2020-21 out of a \$10.2 million total spend for the upgrade of the Gold Coast Ambulance Operations Centre and the redevelopment of the Southport Ambulance Station.



Nerang State High School

\$5 million over three years for the refurbishment of the existing multi-purpose hall.

18 Miami State High School

\$10 million over four years to construct a new indoor sports facility.

Robina Hospital

\$6.5 million in 2020-21 out of a \$10 million total spend for construction projects to improve facilities at the Robina Hospital site.

Part of a \$265 million total spend for the delivery of seven Satellite Hospitals to enable our acute hospitals to continue safely managing patients via alternative models of care.



Palm Beach State School

\$4.8 million in 2020-21 out of a \$10.6 million total spend to construct a new building with additional classrooms.



\$50.4 million in 2020-21 out of a \$709.9 million total spend to extend the light rail transit system from Broadbeach South to Burleigh Heads. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government and the Gold Coast City Council.



Pacific Motorway (M1) (Varsity Lakes to Tugun)

\$145 million in 2020-21 out of a \$1 billion total spend to widen the Pacific Motorway to six lanes between Varsity Lakes and Tugun, to reduce congestion and travel times. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.

Palm Beach Community Health Centre

\$920,260 in 2020-21 out of a \$1.4 million total spend for the replacement of two passenger lifts and the existing chillers, air conditioning units, duct work, diffusers, pumps, piping and related components.

Palm Beach Currumbin State High School

\$10 million over four years to construct a new multi-purpose hall

Currumbin Beach Vikings Surf Life Saving Club upgrade

\$2 million to upgrade the clubhouse including disability access on the ground floor.

Robina Raptors Junior Rugby League Football Club

\$253,142 in 2020-21 out of a \$378,700 total spend to Robina Raptors to construct change rooms and amenities to support female participation in rugby league and football at Robina.

29 Piggabeen Road eco-parkland

\$500,000 in 2020-21 out of a \$15 million total spend to transform the Piggabeen Road site into a 148 hectare eco-parkland featuring recreational and eco-tourism facilities and protections for local koala habitats.

30 Tweed Coolangatta Junior Australian Football Club

\$286,858 in 2020-21 out of a \$500,000 total spend to construct an amenities block to support female participation in AFL at Coolangatta.

31 Springbrook National Park visitor infrastructure upgrade

\$746,000 in 2020-21 out of a \$750,000 total spend to replace visitor infrastructure at Natural Bridge - Springbrook National Park.

Second M1 funding to bust congestion and back jobs

A key focus of economic recovery in the Gold Coast region is investment in congestion busting infrastructure that also supports local jobs. The Queensland Government and Australian Government have committed \$1.53 billion towards Stage 1 of the Coomera Connector – also referred to as the 'second M1' – between Coomera and Nerang, estimated to support over 500 direct jobs over the life of the project.

Improving travel times, Stage 1 of the Coomera Connector project would take up to 60,000 vehicles off the M1 every day at its busiest section around the Coomera River.

The Department of Transport and Main Roads will continue its work to complete the business case by mid-2021, to ensure community input feeds into the design.





Extending Gold Coast Light Rail

Work has begun to prepare for construction of stage 3 of the Gold Coast Light Rail. The \$709.9 million project, jointly funded with the Australian Government and the City of Gold Coast, will extend light rail from Broadbeach to Burleigh.

This next stage is expected to support approximately 760 jobs and lessen congestion on the roads along the southern Gold Coast. By extending the existing light rail, alongside improved pedestrian and cycling facilities, the Queensland Government is supporting the delivery of world-class transport that will make the Gold Coast more connected and accessible for its residents and visitors.

The Queensland Government has also committed planning funding for a future light rail link to the Gold Coast Airport.

Tax Relief Package

The Government provided significant tax relief to support Queensland businesses, landlords, tenants, pubs and clubs, including:

- Payroll tax refunds, waivers and deferrals for eligible businesses, targeted at small to medium businesses
- A payroll tax exemption for wages subsidised by the JobKeeper payment
- Land tax rebates, waivers and deferrals for eligible taxpayers.

An estimated 1,120 businesses in the Gold Coast will also benefit in 2020-21 from the higher payroll tax threshold.


STATEWIDE HIGHLIGHTS

This Budget is focused on creating jobs and getting our economy moving sooner. Initiatives include:


- Driving the largest infrastructure program in over a decade \$14.8 billion in 2020–21, directly supporting 46,000 jobs. Around 58% of the capital program and 28,700 of the jobs supported will be outside the Greater Brisbane area.
- Enhancing frontline services.
 The Budget will support funding for additional frontline health staff including 5,800 nurses, 1,500 doctors and 1,700 allied health professionals through to 2024.
- Backing small businesses
 to support jobs and
 communities. More than
 \$7 billion in COVID-19
 stimulus measures have been
 provided so far, including
 reducing business costs
 through payroll tax relief and
 other tax relief measures,
 and accelerating projects
 to unlock development and
 increase economic activity.
- Increasing investment in manufacturing including \$1 billion to make trains again in Queensland.

- Growing our regions and supporting key industries such as tourism, agriculture and mining. An additional \$200 million will be provided to the Works for Queensland program to support local governments outside South East Queensland.
- Providing more Queenslanders with access to the skills and training they need for rewarding careers. \$100 million has been provided over three years to upgrade TAFE campuses.
- Providing concessions and easing the cost of living, with an estimated \$6.3 billion in 2020–21 in targeted discounts, fee waivers, rebates, and subsidies.
- Protecting the environment.
 The Great Barrier Reef will benefit from an additional \$40 million worth of support. This includes \$10 million for a Reef Assist Program and \$6 million over four years for the GBR Island Arks project to deliver ecotourism in the region.
- Delivering lower debt than New South Wales and Victoria.
