### SCOPE AND PURPOSE OF THE CONSOLIDATED FUND FINANCIAL REPORT

### **Statutory Requirement**

The Financial Accountability Act 2009 (the Act) provides that at the end of every financial year the Treasurer shall prepare and transmit to the Auditor-General a statement containing particulars of transactions of the Consolidated Fund and details of appropriation paid to each Department (including adjustments to original appropriation). This statement, known as the Consolidated Fund Financial Report (CFFR), is to be transmitted to the Auditor-General by a date that allows the Auditor-General to complete the audit of the statement and prepare a report on it within three months after the end of the financial year. The statement and the report of the Auditor-General are then to be tabled in the Legislative Assembly by the Treasurer within fourteen days of their return by the Auditor-General.

### **Consolidated Fund Accounts**

The Act requires the Treasurer to keep ledger accounts for the Consolidated Fund consisting of:

- the Treasurer's Consolidated Fund Operating Account; and
- the Treasurer's Consolidated Fund Investment Account.

### **Basis of Accounting**

### Gross Cash Basis

The Consolidated Fund Financial Report records transactions on the cash basis of accounting, in contrast to Departmental reporting which is on the accrual basis of accounting. Transactions are recorded in the Consolidated Fund accounts at the time of receipt or issue of cash. In relation to the finalisation of appropriations under section 29(1) and section 37(3) of the Act and in accordance with section 22(6) of the Act, payments made from and receipts paid to the Consolidated Fund within two weeks after the end of the financial year relating to that financial year may be included in the appropriation for that year. For 2021-22, cash appropriations were finalised by 30 June 2022.

### Rounding

Amounts included in this statement have been rounded to the nearest \$1,000 or where that amount is \$500 or less, to zero.

Amounts may not add to totals both across and downwards due to rounding.

### **Meanings of Certain Words**

The following words appearing in the Statement of Appropriations have these meanings:

### Transfers

Transfers made under section 79 of the Act represent the transfer of appropriation between departments approved by Governor in Council following a redistribution of Government business.

Treasurer's Transfers made under section 33 of the Act include transfers of appropriation between headings within a Department's vote, approved by the Treasurer.

### Unforeseen Expenditure

Unforeseen Expenditure refers to expenditure authorised by the Governor in Council, under section 35 of the Act, to be made in advance of appropriation. Such authorisation may be given for expenditure where there is no appropriation, or there is an appropriation but the making or charging of the expenditure to a department's vote would mean that the amount allocated to the vote would be exceeded.

Expenditure refers to payments from the Consolidated Fund to departments. It does not necessarily mean that departments have had increased expenses. Departments may also use the funds for capital purchases and/or debt repayments which do not impact the net operating balance.

### Lapsed Appropriation

Lapsed Appropriation means appropriation that has lapsed under section 29 of the Act. This section states that where the available amount (total amount appropriated) is not paid to a Department within the financial year or within the further two weeks, the unpaid amount of the appropriation lapses at the end of the further two weeks.

### **Explanatory Notes to the Statement of Appropriations**

These explanatory notes are in relation to appropriation adjustments and explain the variance between the appropriation heading amount in the Appropriation Acts, adjusted for section 79 (machinery of Government) transfers, and actual appropriation paid.

1. Department of Agriculture and Fisheries – Additional departmental services were primarily due to increased Australian Government funding for various programs including the Horticultural Netting Program and the Future Drought Fund, increased State funding for various programs including the Drought Assistance and Reform Package (including the reclassification of funding from administered) and the Fire Ant Suppression Taskforce and funding related to the Jobs and Regional Growth Fund reallocated from Queensland Treasury (some subsequently reclassified to capital), partly offset by timing adjustments for a number of programs including cluster fencing and feral pest control and other biosecurity measures, the Queensland Agriculture Workforce Network, Native Timber Action Plan, and the Sustainable Fisheries.

Lower equity adjustments were primarily due to timing adjustments the Central Queensland Smart Cropping Centre, partly offset by funding related to the Regional Jobs Growth Fund reallocated from Queensland Treasury's departmental services and reclassified to equity.

Lower administered items were primarily due to timing adjustments for the North Queensland Economic Diversification and the North Queensland Restocking, Replanting and On-farm Infrastructure Grant scheme, reclassification to departmental services of the Queensland Drought Assistance and Reform Package and savings in the COVID-19 Jobs Loan Administration, partly offset by funding reallocated from the Department of State Development, Infrastructure, Local Government and Planning for the North Queensland Recovery Resilience Grant program (Stream 2) administered by the Queensland Rural and Industry Development Authority.

Transfers from equity adjustments and administered items were applied to partly offset the additional departmental services.

2. Department of Children, Youth Justice and Multicultural Affairs – Additional departmental services were primarily due to increased funding for out-of-home care and services in response to ongoing pressures arising from an increase in demand in the child protection system, enterprise bargaining outcomes, the adjustments for West Moreton Youth Detention Centre temporary buildings, and for Unify (the Integrated Client Management System Replacement Program).

Lower equity adjustments primarily related to savings on the construction of the West Moreton Youth Detention Centre, of the return of funding provided for the West Moreton Youth Detention Centre temporary buildings adjustments, partly offset by funding adjustments for Unify (the Integrated Client Management System Replacement Program), and timing adjustments to the sale of the Children's Court building.

Lower administered items primarily resulted from adjustments related to the National Redress Scheme.

Transfers from equity adjustments and administered items were applied to partly offset the additional departmental services.

3. Department of Communities, Housing and Digital Economy – Lapses in departmental services were primarily due to timing adjustments to various programs including the Housing Investment Growth Initiative, Indigenous Home Ownership, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Housing Action Plan, Deed of Grants in Trust and Remote Indigenous Capital Delivery, the reclassification from operating to capital for various projects and the reallocation of funding to the Department of Energy and Public Works. These were partly offset by funding adjustments to programs such as the Microsoft Core CAL and SAP software and support.

Lapses in equity adjustments were primarily due to timing adjustments for various programs including New Performing Arts Venue and other projects for the Queensland Performing Arts Complex, Building Boost, Public Rental Housing, Remote Indigenous Capital Delivery, Jimaylya Topsy Harry Centre, Youth Foyer Townsville and the National Partnership on Remote Housing, partly offset by timing adjustments for the Housing Investment Growth Initiative and the reclassification from operating to capital.

Lapses in administered items primarily resulted from timing adjustments for CITEC SAP Replacement and CITEC Data Centre Relocation Program and adjustments for the funding of the Residential Tenancies Authority, partly offset by additional funding for enterprise bargaining outcomes.

4. Department of Education – Lower departmental services were primarily due to timing adjustments to various school and racing infrastructure programs, lower state funding for schools through the National School Reform Agreement and associated Bilateral Agreement, partly offset by increased funding for kindergarten programs and revised estimates for depreciation.

Lower equity adjustments were primarily due to the timing adjustments to Building Future Schools funding, School Halls and Future Skills Pathway Program, Infrastructure Investment Portfolio and revised estimates for depreciation.

Additional administered items were primarily due to increased Australian and State Government funding for non-state schools.

Transfers from departmental services and equity adjustments were applied to offset the additional administered items.

5. Electoral Commission of Queensland – Lapses in departmental services were primarily due to savings in funding for 2020 the State election, election laptop proceeds of sale and timing adjustment for by-election funding for Callide.

Lapses in equity adjustments were primarily related to a timing adjustment of residual works for the Election Management System.

6. Department of Employment, Small Business and Training — Additional departmental services are primarily due to increased Australian and State Government funding for Business Support Grants and revised depreciation estimates, partly offset by timing adjustments for a number of programs, including the Australian Government's JobTrainer Fund and Infection Control Training and State-funded programs including Skilling Queenslanders for Work and the Future Skills Fund, savings on the Back to Work Program and the Workers' Assistance Package and the reallocation of funding for the Working in Paradise Program to the Department of Tourism, Innovation and Sport.

Lower equity adjustments primarily resulted from timing adjustments to infrastructure delivery and revised depreciation estimates.

Transfers from equity adjustments were applied to partly offset the additional departmental services.

7. Department of Energy and Public Works – Lower departmental services were primarily due to timing adjustments for various building maintenance and policy programs, including Ecosciences Building works and the Queensland Renewable Energy Zones program, partly offset by additional funding for the commercial and residential Government employee housing programs, the reallocation of funding from the Department of Communities, Housing and Digital Economy and enterprise bargaining outcomes.

Lower equity adjustments are primarily due to timing adjustments relating to building works including the Cairns Convention Centre Refurbishment and Expansion project, Ecosciences Building works and residential Government employee housing new construction programs, partly offset by increased funding for the Thomas Dixon Centre Redevelopment and the Borumba Pumped Hydro Energy Storage and timing adjustments to bring forward funding for the Office Accommodation Program.

Additional administered items were primarily due to increased funding for the Queensland Renewable Energy Zone project, Energy Queensland Uniform Tariff Policy and additional claims for Energy Drought Relief Arrangements - Electricity Charges Scheme, partly offset by timing adjustments to the Australian Government-funded North Queensland Strata Title Inspection scheme.

Transfers from departmental services and equity adjustments were applied to partly offset the additional administered items.

8. Department of Environment and Science – Additional departmental services were primarily due to bringing forward payments to local councils in relation to revenue collected from the Waste Disposal Levy and increased funding for enterprise bargaining outcomes, partly offset by timing adjustments for various programs including the Queensland Reef Water Quality Program and savings from projects related to the Queensland Waste Levy Implementation and Underground Coal Gasification Investigations.

Lower equity adjustments were primarily due to timing adjustments for various programs including building and infrastructure programs on protected area estates such as World Heritage Visitor Infrastructure Improvements, Quandamooka Country and Revitalising National Parks, partly offset by recoupments of Round 1 Land Restoration Fund Investments.

Transfers from equity adjustments were applied to partly offset the additional departmental services.

9. Department of Justice and Attorney-General – Additional departmental services primarily due to enterprise bargaining outcomes, Australian Government funding for the Family, Domestic and Sexual Violence Responses 2021-23 National Partnerships, adjustments to depreciation funding and the reclassification, from operating to capital, of funding for various projects including the Blue Card Services review and upgrades within the Brisbane Supreme and District Court and Ipswich Courthouse, partly offset by timing adjustments and savings in programs including the Government's response to the Women's Safety and Justice Taskforce report, the ICT Strategy Implementation Program and Youth Sexual Violence Abuse initiatives.

Lower equity adjustments were primarily due to depreciation funding adjustments, partially offset by the reclassification of operating funding for various projects.

Additional administered items primarily relate to additional Australian Government funding for the National Legal Assistance Partnership Agreement, partly offset by adjustments to the Judges' long service leave entitlements and Victim Assist claims.

Transfers from equity adjustments were applied to partly offset the additional departmental services.

**10.** Legislative Assembly and Parliamentary Service – Additional departmental services were due to additional funding for enterprise bargaining outcomes and speech recognition technology for parliamentary proceedings.

Additional equity adjustments were due to the additional funding for speech recognition technology for parliamentary proceedings.

- **11. Office of the Governor** Additional departmental services were primarily due to additional funding for enterprise bargaining outcomes.
- **12.** Office of the Inspector-General of Emergency Management Additional departmental services were due to additional funding for enterprise bargaining outcomes and back pay.
- **13.** Office of the Ombudsman Lapses in departmental services were primarily due to timing of vacancies in 2020-21 and revised estimates for depreciation and amortisation.
- **14. Department of the Premier and Cabinet** Additional departmental services were primarily due to additional funding for the COVID-19 response and recovery taskforce, and enterprise bargaining outcomes, partly offset by timing adjustments and savings for a number of programs including program management and reviews, Anzac Square Undercroft Galleries, the graduate program and ICT high priority projects.

Lower administered items primarily related to timing adjustments for various Screen Queensland programs, ICT and other programs.

Transfers from administered items were applied to offset the additional departmental services.

- **15. Public Service Commission** Lapses in departmental services were largely due to timing adjustments to a number of programs including leadership and learning, Special Commissioner Equity and Diversity, digital platforms and legal fees, partly offset by enterprise bargaining outcomes.
- **16. Queensland Audit Office** Lapses in departmental services were primarily due to lower software licencing contributions.
- **17. Queensland Corrective Services** Additional departmental services were primarily due to additional funding to respond to increased prisoner numbers and enterprise bargaining outcomes, partly offset by revised estimates for depreciation.

Lower equity adjustments primarily due to timing adjustments for the construction of the Southern Queensland Correctional Precinct – Stage 2, partly offset by revised estimates for depreciation.

Transfers from equity adjustments were applied to offset the additional departmental services.

18. Queensland Fire and Emergency Services – Additional departmental services were primarily due to funding for the COVID-19 response, particularly for quarantine accommodation, additional firefighters and adjustments to funding previously reallocated from the Public Safety Business Agency, which was abolished on 1 July 2021, partly offset by timing adjustments for the Royal Commission into Natural Disaster Arrangements and savings in a number of programs such as Bushfire mitigation.

Additional equity adjustments were primarily due to adjustments to funding previously reallocated from the Public Safety Business Agency which was abolished on 1 July 2021 and for additional firefighters.

19. Queensland Health – Lapses in departmental services were primarily due to the reprofiling of funding to align with expected expenditure and the net impact of the reclassification of operating funding to capital which includes Personal Protective and other Equipment related to the COVID-19 Pandemic. The timing adjustments reflect the ongoing demand for public hospital services and largely relate to programs such as the Performance Stabilisation Funding, Queensland Government Clinical Reserve Stockpile, the Patient Administration System and adjustments for the prepayment of funding for the Commonwealth Teletrials five-year program. This is partly offset by funding, primarily to support the COVID-19 Pandemic Response, the Brisbane Airport Corporation Aeromedical Hub project and Queensland Ambulance.

Lapses in equity adjustments were primarily due to significant delays in delivering capital infrastructure, as a result of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, for projects including eHealth ICT, Sustaining Capital, Gold Coast Secure Mental Health Rehabilitation Unit, Ipswich Hospital Expansion and Cairns Hospital Mental Health Unit. This was partly offset by funding primarily for COVID-19 Pandemic Equipment and the Brisbane Airport Corporation Aeromedical Hub project and the net impact of the reclassification of operating funding to capital including for Personal Protective and other Equipment related to the COVID-19 Pandemic.

Lapses in administered items were primarily due to timing adjustments to funding Health and Wellbeing Queensland.

20. Queensland Police Service – Additional departmental services were primarily due to additional funding for COVID-19 compliance activities, reclassification of funding of ICT projects from capital, partly offset by timing adjustments and savings for the Camera Detected Offence Program, savings on QGAir service delivery and adjustments to funding previously reallocated from the Public Safety Business Agency.

Lower equity adjustments resulted from the reclassification of funding of ICT projects to operating and adjustments to the Camera Detected Offence Program, partly offset by additional funding for COVID-19 compliance activities.

Transfers from equity adjustments were applied to partly offset the additional departmental services.

21. Queensland Treasury – Lower departmental services were primarily due to timing adjustments related to a number of initiatives including Jobs and Regional Growth Fund, Advance Queensland Industry Attraction Fund, Queensland Revenue Office's Debt Management System, Whole of government priorities, Defence Projects and the reallocation of funding related to the Jobs and Regional Growth Fund to the Department of Agriculture, partly offset by funding for the Backing Queensland Building Investment Fund (BQBIF) valuation adjustment and timing adjustments for the expensing of software licences.

Additional equity adjustments were primarily due to funding for the acquisition of the Visy Glass Operations site, partly offset by the return of funding for the BQBIF valuation adjustment and timing adjustments for the return of funding related to the expensing of software licences.

Additional administered items were primarily due to additional funding for the Commonwealth HomeBuilder Grant, revised Queensland Government Insurance Fund claims and beneficiary payments for superannuation and central leave schemes and additional First Home Owners Grants, partly offset by the return of prior year savings and lower whole-of-Government borrowing requirements.

Transfers from departmental services were applied to partly offset the additional equity adjustments.

22. Department of Regional Development, Manufacturing and Water – Lower departmental services were primarily due to timing adjustments for a number of programs including the Emu Swamp Dam Project, Building Our Regions and Manufacturing Hubs, partly offset by additional Australian Government funding for programs including successful National Water Grid Fund applications and Rural Water Futures – Northern Murray-Darling Basin Metering Program and a reclassification from capital for the Rookwood Weir project.

Additional equity adjustments were due to additional funding for Rookwood Weir project, partly offset by a reclassification to operating for the Rookwood Weir project.

Lower administered items were primarily due to the ceasing of various grant programs including Emergency Water Supply measures and Goondiwindi Regional Council Drought grants and timing adjustments relating to the Horticulture Irrigation Pricing Rebase Scheme.

Transfers from departmental services and administered items were applied to offset the additional equity adjustments.

23. Department of Resources – Lapses in departmental services were primarily due to the timing adjustments for a number of programs including the ICT Consolidation program, affected by supply chain issues, Native Title Compensation Office, the Bowen Basin pipeline project due to delayed project commencement and abandoned mine site remediation programs impacted by adverse weather conditions. These were partly offset by additional funding for enterprise bargaining outcomes.

Lapses in administered items were due to timing adjustments to Copperfield Dam and general maintenance projects affected by COVID-19 related interruptions and scope changes.

24. Department of Seniors, Disability Services and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Partnerships – Lapses in departmental services were primarily due to funding adjustments for the Disability Worker Screening function which received approval to be funded from own-source revenue, operating savings and timing adjustments to various programs including Thursday Island Splash Parks and Alcohol Management, partly offset by enterprise bargaining outcomes.

Lapses in equity adjustments were primarily due to timing adjustments related to the Wacol Forensic Disability Transition Accommodation.

Lapses in administered items primarily related to lower concessions and reductions in the costs of the transport subsidy scheme and the electricity rebate subsidy scheme, partly offset by a funding adjustment for NDIS and additional funding for Western Cape Communities Trust Royalty.

### 25. Department of State Development, Infrastructure, Local Government and Planning –

Lower departmental services were primarily due to timing adjustments for various programs including Haughton Pipeline - Stage 2, Works for Queensland programs, Building our Regions, Local Government Grants and Subsidies Program, Modern Manufacturing Initiative, Industry Partnership Program, Emerging Hydrogen Industry, and Indigenous Councils Critical Infrastructure Program and the reclassification of Currumbin Eco-Parkland to capital, partly offset by funding for the Queensland Regional Accommodation Centre, Quarantine Management Program, Australian-Singapore Military Training Initiative and reprofiling of the South East Queensland Stimulus Program and the Resources Community Infrastructure Fund and the reclassification of Building Queensland funding from administered.

Additional equity adjustments were primarily due to funding for the Queensland Regional Accommodation Centre, additional funding for the Building Acceleration Fund and investment in a vaccine manufacturing facility and the reclassification of the Currumbin Eco-Parkland from operating.

Additional administered items primarily related to the on-forwarding of the Australian Government's partial prepayment of 2022-23 funding for Financial Assistance Grants to local governments and funding adjustments for Queensland Reconstruction Authority to cover the recovery and reconstruction costs primarily arising the flooding in the summer of 2021-22, partly offset by the reclassification of Building Queensland funding to departmental services.

Transfers from departmental services were applied to offset the additional equity adjustments.

26. Department of Tourism, Innovation and Sport – Additional departmental services were primarily due to increased Australian and State Government funding for various programs including Tourism and Hospitality Sector Hardship Support, Tourism Recovery and Development Initiatives, and various sporting events as well as the reallocation of funding for the Work in Paradise Program from the Department of Employment, Small Business and Training, partly offset by timing adjustments for sport-related programs, and other Tourism programs including Advance Queensland and Great Keppel Island Infrastructure, and the reclassification of Queensland Academy of Sport funding to administered equity for Stadiums Queensland's upgrade of two venues and timing adjustments for the Attracting Aviation Investment Fund.

Lower equity adjustments primarily resulted from timing adjustments in relation to Wangetti Trail capital program and Queensland Active Precincts.

Additional administered items were due increased funding for Stadiums Queensland, the reclassification of Queensland Academy of Sport funding to administered equity for Stadiums Queensland's upgrade of two venues, partly offset by timing adjustments for Tourism Events Queensland activities.

Transfers from equity adjustments were applied to partly offset the additional departmental services.

27. Department of Transport and Main Roads – Lower departmental services are primarily due to aligning cash flows to project delivery for a number of State and Commonwealth initiatives including rollingstock projects and the Queensland Rail Transport Service Contract, as well as the reclassification of the Coomera Connector to capital, partly offset by timing adjustments for the delivery of the Infrastructure Investment Program – Roads, increased funding for road maintenance (from increased motor vehicle registration revenue) and revised estimates for depreciation.

Additional equity adjustments were primarily due to the accelerated expenditure on various capital programs including roads (Bruce Highway Upgrades, Passenger Transport Infrastructure and National Land Transport Network Upgrades and other works) and rail infrastructure, funding to help offset COVID-19 impacts on fare revenue and the reclassification of funding for the Coomera Connector from operating, partly offset by adjustments to align cash flows to project delivery for various Australian and State Government funded programs and projects, including Gold Coast Light Rail Stage 3, Roads of Strategic Importance Initiative, New Generation Rollingstock, Infrastructure Investment Program for Rail Component and Northern Australia Roads, as well as revised estimates for depreciation.

Lower administered items were primarily due to aligning cash flows to project delivery for the Cross River Rail Delivery Authority, Mount Isa to Townsville Rail Line, and the Townsville Channel Capacity Upgrade Project.

Transfers from departmental services and administered items were applied to partly offset the additional equity adjustments.

### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Treasurer of Queensland

### Report on the Consolidated Fund Financial Report Opinion

I have audited the accompanying Consolidated Fund Financial Report.

In my opinion, the financial report –

- (a) gives a true and fair view of the transactions of the consolidated fund accounts for the financial year 1 July 2021 to 30 June 2022 and of the financial position of the accounts as at the end of that year;
- (b) is in agreement with the consolidated fund accounts for the financial year; and
- (c) complies with the Financial Accountability Act 2009.

The financial report comprises the statement of receipts and payments for the quarter ended and year ended 30 June 2022 and related notes, the statement of appropriations for the year ended 30 June 2022 and related explanatory notes and the certificate given by the Treasurer of Queensland. The report has been prepared using the cash basis of accounting.

### **Basis for opinion**

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

### **Emphasis of Matter - Basis of Accounting**

I draw attention to the Basis of Accounting under the scope and purpose of the financial report. The financial report has been prepared on a cash basis for the purpose of fulfilling the Treasurer's financial reporting responsibilities under the *Financial Accountability Act 2009*. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose. My opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

### Responsibilities of the Treasurer for the financial report
