SEVERE TROPICAL CYCLONE DEBBIE RECOVERY

More than 1,000km to the south of where STC Debbie crossed the coast, the Logan and Scenic Rim regions received heavy rainfall and the Albert River and Logan River both burst their banks. Severe damage was sustained to properties, businesses, roads and bridges.

Logan City Council reported that 111 roads closed for up to five days and 12 roads were severely damaged. Alan Wilkie Bridge and Chardon Bridge were cut and 15,000 properties were without power for up to a week. At least 38 homes were left uninhabitable and approximately 200 properties were inundated above habitable flood levels. Nearly 50 businesses were directly inundated and 3,000 tonnes of green and hard waste was removed.

Scenic Rim Regional Council reported that more than 80 homes were damaged and farmers lost significant lengths of fencing. Beaudesert-Boonah Road and the Mount Lindesay Highway transport routes were cut for two days. Seven bridges and at least 350 local roads were damaged, impacting community connectivity and increasing isolation.

As at 1 June 2017, more than 20,000 people in Logan and the Scenic Rim have accessed immediate hardship grants totalling approximately \$3.5 million and more than \$311,000 has been provided to primary producers in the two regions to assist with clean-up and recovery.

Regional Action Plan

INVESTING IN JOBS FOR LOGAN

Logan, centrally located between the major centres of Brisbane and the Gold Coast, and with expansive bushland reserves to the south, brings together the best of South East Queensland. Logan is poised to take advantage of the significant population growth expected in the region over the coming decades, and has shown its resilience as it recovers from the aftermath of Severe Tropical Cyclone Debbie. The Palaszczuk Government is investing in jobs for Logan through a diverse range of projects and initiatives:

Pacific Motorway / **Gateway Motorway Merge**

\$10 million in 2017-18 out of a \$170 million total spend to upgrade the Pacific Motorway/Gateway Motorway Merge, due for completion in September 2022. Part of the State Infrastructure Fund, delivered in partnership with the Australian Government. Indicative total project cost to be confirmed through the procurement process. Australian Government contribution capped at \$115 million, with the Queensland Government to fund the balance.

Daisy Hill Koala Bushland

\$2.8 million in 2017-18 out of a \$3.3 million total spend to upgrade facilities at the Daisy Hill Koala Bushland precinct in preparation for the Gold Coast 2018 Commonwealth Games.

Logan Motorway Enhancement Project

Through the Queensland Government's Market Led Proposals framework, Transurban Queensland will deliver a \$512 million enhancement to the Logan and Gateway Extension motorway. The project will improve safety and relieve local traffic congestion. The project is expected to be completed in mid-2019.



The biggest commitment to housing in the State's recent history includes:

- ◆ **\$1.2 billion** to renew the social housing property portfolio
- ◆ **\$420 million** to boost the supply of social and affordable housing
- ◆ **\$75 million** to progress home ownership in discrete Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities
- ◆ **\$100 million** for reforms to the housing and homelessness service system.

Additional funding of **\$30 million** is also provided in the 2017-18 Budget to extend the temporary increase in the **Queensland First Home Owners' Grant**, from \$15,000 to \$20,000 for six months.



THE PALASZCZUK GOVERNMENT'S PLAN FOR JOBS IN QUEENSLAND

The Government's focus on creating opportunities for all Queenslanders has seen stronger economic growth, a return in business and consumer confidence and a drop in the State's unemployment rate. More than **59,000 jobs** have been created in Queensland since January 2015.

The 2017-18 Budget reinforces the Government's commitment to drive more inclusive economic growth and create more jobs in regional Queensland.

A **\$42.75 billion** four year capital works program will support thousands of jobs across the State, providing the infrastructure needed to promote long term prosperity. Around 63 per cent of total capital purchases will be spent outside of Greater Brisbane in 2017-18.

The 2017-18 Budget will ensure the ongoing resilience of communities impacted by Severe Tropical Cyclone Debbie and its aftermath, with **\$1.1 billion** to be spent on rebuilding critical infrastructure.

Regional communities will directly benefit from significant initiatives in the 2017-18 Budget, including:

- Record investment in education and training (\$13.7 billion) and health (\$16.6 billion) focused on enhancing frontline services
- ◆ Record **\$1.8 billion** over 10 years for housing, including **\$1.62 billion** to renew existing social housing dwellings and to increase the supply of social and affordable housing
- ◆ **\$5.344 billion** in concessions to help Queenslanders who need it most and to reduce the price paid by all consumers in areas such as transport, electricity and water
- ◆ **\$1.16 billion** Powering Queensland Plan to secure electricity supply, reduce electricity costs and create 5,000 jobs
- \$50 million increase in the Back to Work Program and an additional \$200 million for the Works for Queensland Program (bringing the total commitment to \$400 million) in regional communities
- \$2.37 billion in 2017-18 for the Queensland Police Service to help make our communities safer.




