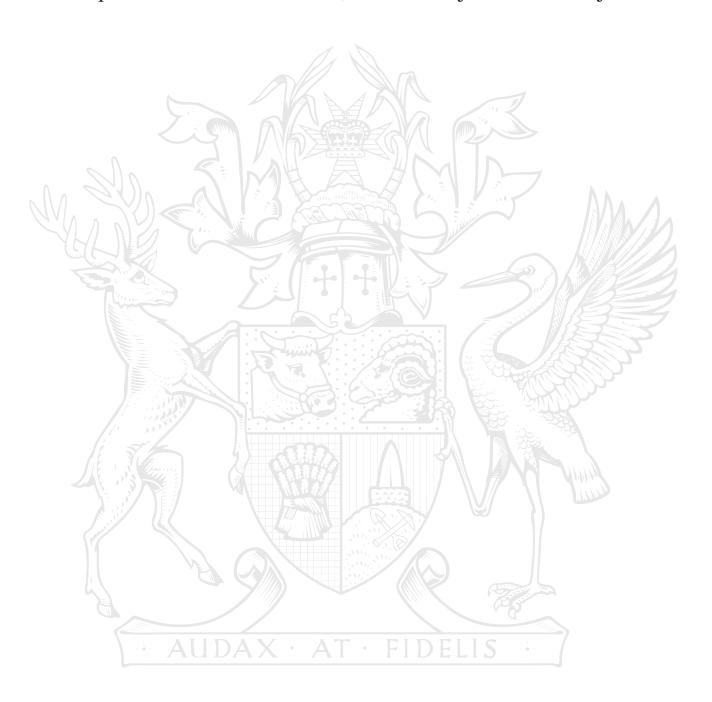

RESOURCES AND PERFORMANCE

DEPARTMENTAL OVERVIEW

Strategic direction

The Department of Communities, Child Safety and Disability Services is committed to supporting and protecting the wellbeing of vulnerable Queenslanders, and supporting excellence in the delivery of frontline human services to Queenslanders.

Our organisation consists of the following divisions:

- Regional Services
- Operations
- Strategic Policy and Programs
- Corporate and Executive Services.

The department's key objectives are:

- For our clients: improved wellbeing, safety, and participation of Queenslanders, particularly for vulnerable and disadvantaged people
- For communities: improved liveability, inclusion and cohesion in Queensland communities
- For our partners: improved capability, sustainability and productivity of human and other services and systems in Queensland.

The department contributes to achieving Queensland's future prosperity through the delivery of the Government's objectives for the community to:

- Grow a four pillar economy by:
 - contributing to paying off Queensland's debt and investing in better frontline services
 - improving financial management and eliminating waste by undertaking program reviews and transitioning to more cost effect service delivery models.
- Lower the cost of living for families by:
 - providing concessions on electricity, gas, medical aids and electricity life support.
- Deliver better infrastructure and better planning by:
 - facilitating integrated community support services across the state by identifying and quantifying the immediate impact of services/programs delivered or funded.
- Revitalise frontline services for families by:
 - implementing relevant Government commitments
 - investing in effective and efficient community and volunteer groups
 - participating in national strategies and partnerships that benefit Queenslanders.
- Restore accountability in government by:
 - driving value for money and reducing red tape in government and non-Government organisation (NGOs) human services, for example by implementing a single human services quality framework, and contract management reforms with non-Government organisations
 - improving laws, and procurement and contracting processes for administering funding and other resources
 - supporting the review and audit of Queensland's child protection laws and practices.

Environmental factors that shape our strategic directions and services include:

- population growth and changing demographics
- increasing demand for, and cost of delivering, community services

- increasing expectations for better access to integrated, quality community, disability and child safety services
- contemporary evidence and research about the most effective and efficient methods of service delivery
- the significant impact of natural disasters on Queenslanders and on the state and national economies.

In 2012-13, the total operating expenditure for the Department of Communities, Child Safety and Disability Services is \$2.564 billion.

The Government is committed to promoting a more sustainable community service system that delivers better value for Queenslanders. The department works in partnership with the non-Government sector to deliver services across the state to a diverse range of people. In 2012-13, the department will provide indexation on a range of existing State-funded ongoing operational grants to funded organisations at a rate of 3.75% in recognition of the increased cost of service delivery.

The Government has identified an opportunity to redirect available funding for non-Government organisations to areas of greatest need, by ceasing or reducing funding for programs and services that are lower priority and requiring efficiency improvements from State funded organisations to contribute to the fiscal repair.

The Government has also identified an opportunity to redesign the organisational arrangements of the department to prioritise and focus on direct service delivery and improve value for money. Savings identified will contribute to funding transitional placements for children with highly complex needs in out of home placements and to repair and restore the State's fiscal position.

In 2012-13 State funding for specialist disability services has increased by 3% from almost \$931 million in 2011-12 to almost \$959 million in 2012-13. Funding for Disability Services shown in the 2012-13 Service Summary excludes funding for psychiatric disability services transferred to Queensland Health and reflects the reduction in Commonwealth funding under the former Home and Community Care Program from 1 July 2012.

Funding for Child Safety Services has increased by 5.6% due to internal reprioritisation of funding for transitional placements for children with highly complex needs living in out of home placements.

Queenslanders with a disability will be further supported with an additional \$6.5 million (\$26 million over four years) to fund extra respite for people with high needs disabilities aged 16 to 25 years and their families and carers, and establish Parent Connect to provide assistance to parents of newborns with a disability.

In 2012-13, the department will also begin delivering a number of Government commitments, including:

- commencing Fostering Families, a two year trial of an intensive family intervention program to target neglect, with additional funding of \$4 million over two years
- increasing counselling services for victims of child abuse and sexual assault by providing an additional \$0.38 million (\$1.5 million over four years); this will also provide children from regional areas with access to telephone counselling
- providing \$4 million over three years (from internal reallocation) to community and volunteer groups for essential equipment such as computers, upgraded software and white goods
- assisting as required with the Queensland Child Protection Commission of Inquiry.

The department is enhancing the cost effectiveness of service delivery by:

- streamlining funding legislation, program specifications, quality systems and reporting requirements
- undertaking program reviews to ensure value for money and return on investment or by re-prioritising higher priority and value services and transitioning to more cost effective service delivery models, including reviewing directly delivered disability accommodation and respite services.

SERVICE PERFORMANCE

Our service areas are:

Child Safety Services

Child Safety Services provides services to ensure the safety of children and young people who are in need of protection and to support children in its care. It also funds services to support families whose children may be at risk of harm, and administers adoption legislation in Queensland.

Functions include:

- working with families at risk to address the protection needs of their children and prevent them coming into care
- intake services, including advice and referral information and after hours services
- undertaking investigations and assessments of children who are suspected to be in need of protection
- responding to children assessed in need of protection, including seeking child protection orders and case planning processes
- recruitment and assessment of foster and kinship carers
- working with young people transitioning from care
- Adoption Services Queensland
- child safety policy, program design implementation and monitoring
- child protection service system management and reform.

Disability Services

Disability Services provides information and specialist services to people with a disability, their families and carers. Services also enable people with a disability to participate in the community and include working with the community to improve access and opportunities for people with a disability. Specialist disability services are provided directly and through non-Government organisations across the state.

Functions include:

- disability services policy development, implementation and improvement
- delivery of accommodation support, respite, therapy, family and community support, and community participation services and forensic disability services
- clinical services
- delivery of training in specialist behaviour support in partnership with the Centre of Excellence for Behaviour Support and the University of Queensland
- procurement of disability and community care services from non-government organisations
- disability service system management and reform.

Social Inclusion Services

Social Inclusion Services provides information around youth, volunteering, concessions, carers, seniors and women's issues. Social Inclusion Services also funds organisations across the state to support vulnerable individuals, families and communities, including those who are homeless, people at risk of or experiencing domestic and family violence – including elder abuse, those seeking counselling – including for alcohol and gambling addictions, and young people.

Functions include:

- the Office for Women
- the Office for Seniors, Carers and Volunteers
- the Office for Youth
- provision of information about concessions
- policy and program management for the delivery of services to homeless people and to people experiencing domestic and family violence
- funding to non-government organisations to provide practical assistance and supports to vulnerable Queenslanders
- partnerships with the non-government and other sectors
- service system reform, including around quality and licensing systems
- community recovery responses to natural disasters and emergencies.

The service area structure presented in the document reflects machinery-of-government changes announced by the Premier on 3 April 2012. As part of the machinery-of-government changes, the former Department of Communities was renamed as the Department of Communities, Child Safety and Disability Services.

The structure of the department was altered to transfer:

- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Services to the Department of Aboriginal and Torres Strait
 Islander and Multicultural Affairs
- Multicultural Services to the Department of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and Multicultural Affairs
- Sport and Recreation Services to the Department of National Parks, Recreation, Sport and Racing
- housing functions within the former Housing and Homelessness Services to the Department of Housing and Public Works
- youth justice functions within the former Community and Youth Justice Services to the Department of Justice and Attorney General
- community mental health functions within the former Disability and Community Care Services to Queensland Health (from 1 July 2012).

The performance information for these service areas will be reported in the 2012-13 Service Delivery Statement for the department to which the service was transferred.

Notes:

- The rate of children subject to substantiated harm per 1,000 children was higher than expected in 2011-12, and is expected to continue at a higher rate through 2012-13. The 2011-12 target/estimate was based on a historical decline in the number of substantiations. During 2011-12 this trend reversed, and coupled with lower than expected population growth, has resulted in a higher than expected substantiation rate.
- 2. The number of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children subject to protective orders grew faster than expected through 2011-12, while the population growth was lower than expected.
- 3. The decrease in the proportion of children experiencing only one or two placements during their time in care may be partly due to children and young people staying in care for longer. Over recent periods there have been more children admitted to out of home care than exiting care.
- 4. The 2011-12 targets/estimates for notifications and substantiations were calculated on historical declining numbers. During 2011-12, these trends reversed and are now expected to continue to increase slowly.
- 5. The 2011-12 target/estimate was based on data reported prior to June 2011. Since this time, an audit and cleansing of intervention with parental agreement records in the Integrated Client Management System (ICMS) took place. This included closing down historical records where a child was no longer subject to intervention with parental agreement. Data used for the 2011-12 target/estimate is therefore not comparable to subsequent data.
- 6. This is a new service area introduced from 2012-13. In 2011-12, performance information was presented under 'Disability and Community Care Services'.
- 7. Decrease of expenditure per user for community access services from 2011-12 Target/estimate to 2011-12 Estimated actual and 2012-13 Target/estimate reflects a reduction of costs as a result of the implementation of improved service mix.
- 8. The Home and Community Care (HACC) program was formally a State Government responsibility, to which the Australian Government contributed funding. From 1 July 2012 the Australian Government assumed operational responsibility for services to non-Indigenous people aged 65 years or over and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people aged 50 years and over. The Queensland Government retains responsibility for services to non-Indigenous people aged under 65 years and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people aged under 50 years. To reflect change in responsibility to the community care program and to better account for fluctuations in demand and client need across the different community care service groups, the new measure will use the total hours purchased across all the service groups to assess the level of community care services delivered to non-Indigenous people aged under 65 years and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people aged under 50 years.
- 9. The State contribution for Disability Services in the 2011-12 Target/estimate includes \$931 million for Specialist Disability Services (including funding for psychiatric disability services of \$31.3M) and the remainder in other Disability Services. The State contribution in 2012-13 includes \$926 million in Specialist Disability Services (excluding \$32.5 million for psychiatric disability services transferred to Queensland Health on 1 July 2012) and the remainder in other Disability Services.
- 10. Reflects the reduction in Commonwealth funding due to the change in responsibilities under the former Home and Community Care Program (refer note 8).

- 11. This is a new service area introduced from 2012-13. In 2011-12, performance information was presented under 'Community and Youth Justice Services', 'Housing and Homelessness Services' and 'Women's Services'.
- 12. The 2011-12 Estimated actual data is sourced from the Supported Accommodation Assistance Program National Data Collection for 2010-11. Following the implementation of the new Specialist Homelessness Services Collection on 1 July 2011, revised measures and targets for 2012-13 will be established based on consolidated performance data for 2011-12. Data relating to performance in 2011-12 will not be available from the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare until late 2012.
- 13. Take-up of the Card is voluntary. Although significant growth in the number of Card holders has been experienced, this has not, to date, kept pace with population projections.
- 14. This measures usage rates of delivering information and advice to women through the department's Women's Infolink services.

Administered Items

Administered activities are those undertaken by departments on behalf of the Government.

The Department of Communities, Child Safety and Disability Services administers funds on behalf of the State to reimburse providers for concessions to eligible pensioners and seniors for rates, electricity, water, reticulated natural gas and also disburses electricity life support concessions to eligible persons.

The department also administers payments for natural disasters on behalf of the State and Australian Governments, for example, Emergency Assistance Grants, Essential Household Contents Grants, Structural Assistance Grants and Essential Services Safety and Reconnection scheme.

Financial statements and variance explanations in relation to Administered Items appear in the Departmental Financial Statements.

CAPITAL

Capital program

The department's capital program focuses on providing integrated community services to improve the wellbeing, safety, and participation of Queenslanders, particularly vulnerable and disadvantaged people. To support people with a disability, the department is upgrading and constructing a range of accommodation options.

- \$10.7 million in 2012-13 is allocated to Positive Futures accommodation environments for adults with an intellectual or cognitive disability who exhibit severely challenging behaviour.
- \$7.9 million is allocated to specialised purpose-built accommodation for people with particularly complex needs.
- \$0.5 million is allocated to complete infrastructure redevelopment works at the Wacol Disability Services site at a total cost of \$7.5 million.

The department is constructing facilities which will support the provision of services to protect children and young people from harm or who are at risk of harm.

- A total of \$8.4 million has been allocated to deliver the capital component of the Safe Haven Program which provides culturally appropriate services to respond to the safety needs of children, young people and their families. In 2012-13, the remaining \$6 million will be expended. The program operates in the communities of Mornington Island, Coen, Cherbourg and Palm Island.
- \$3.4 million in 2012-13 is allocated for Residential Care Facilities, which will expand the range of placement options for children and young people in the child protection system.
- Under the services for Indigenous Communities Project, \$1.9 million is allocated in 2012-13 to
 continue establishing Safe Houses in the Torres Strait to provide a safe place for Indigenous
 children in the statutory child protection system to remain in their communities, while their
 longer term needs are assessed. In addition, \$3.7 million is allocated to continue establishing
 employee housing and office accommodation to service remote Indigenous communities.

To further support the delivery of frontline services, the department is investing \$10.2 million in 2012-13 on multi-purpose and neighbourhood community centres. These centres provide access to universal community support services and an entry point to more targeted support services.

Analysis of budgeted financial statements

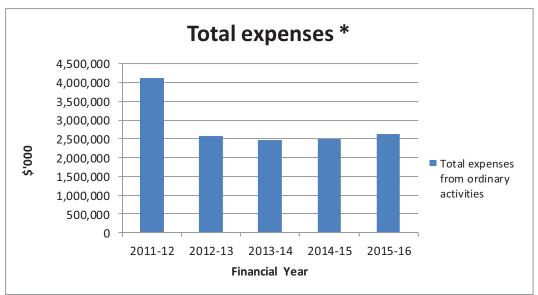
An analysis of the department's budgeted financial statements, as reflected in the department's financial statements, is provided below.

Departmental income statement

Total expenses are estimated to be \$2.564 billion in 2012-13, a decrease of \$1.556 billion from the 2011-12 Adjusted Budget. The decrease is mainly due to:

- the impact of machinery-of-Government changes which took effect from 1 May 2012, in particular, the transfer of Housing Services functions to the Department of Housing and Public Works, Youth Justice functions to the Department of Justice and Attorney General, Sport and Recreation Services to the Department of National Parks, Recreation, Sport and Racing and Department of Tourism, Major Events, Small Business and the Commonwealth Games and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and Multicultural Services to the Department of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and Multicultural Affairs.
- the impact of machinery-of-Government changes which took effect from 1 July 2012 including the transfer of Community Mental Health functions (formerly included in Disability Services) to Queensland Health.
- the department's contribution to fiscal repair.

The major expenditure item for the department is Grants and Subsidies (\$1.756 billion) which represents over 68% of the budget. The department outsources its service delivery of particular programs by contracting non-Government organisations to deliver community, child and family and disability services to vulnerable Queenslanders.

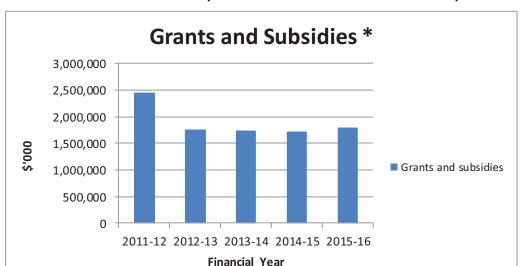


Chart: Grants and Subsidies expenses across the Forward Estimates period

The grants and subsidies forward estimates principally reflect identified savings offset by indexation of grants to the non-government sector reflecting wage indexation and consumer price index changes.

Departmental balance sheet

The department's major assets are in Property, Plant and Equipment (\$349.1 million) which consists mainly of land, buildings and other plant and equipment. It is anticipated that these balances will remain relatively stable over the forward estimates mainly due to expected completion of capital projects relating to the Disabilities Positive Futures Program, Disabilities Wacol Infrastructure Development, Child Safety Residential Care and Therapeutic Resident Care Facilities, Child Safety Remote Indigenous Service Delivery Program and Homelessness Programs as well as identified savings.

The department does not have any interest bearing liabilities or borrowings. Its main liabilities relate to grant payables and other sundry payables at year end. These liabilities are expected to remain relatively stable over the forward estimates period.

Income statement

Major variations between 2011-12 Adjusted Budget and 2011-12 Estimated Actual include:

- Decrease is mainly due to the reallocation of capital grants to capital works relating to Remote
 Indigenous Housing, as well as deferral of funds relating to Housing and Homelessness Services,
 Disability Services and Social Inclusion Services.

COMMISSION FOR CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE AND CHILD GUARDIAN

AGENCY OVERVIEW

Strategic direction

The Commission's mandate is to promote and protect the rights, interests and wellbeing of children and young people in Queensland. In accordance with the Government's objective to restore accountability in government, the Commission's work provides robust, independent oversight of the child protection and youth justice systems, and blue card system services to organisations providing regulated services to children and young people.

The Commission's work is directed towards the achievement of the following strategic objectives:

- all children and young people in Queensland have their rights, interests, safety and wellbeing upheld and enhanced
- children and young people who are disadvantaged or at risk of harm receive appropriate support and early intervention
- Queensland has effective child safety and youth justice systems that protect and support children and young people where statutory intervention is appropriate.

The Commission progresses its strategic agenda through fulfilling the following statutory functions:

- monitoring, auditing and reviewing the effectiveness of the child safety system including the handling of individual cases of children within the system
- actioning complaints and undertaking investigations relating to services provided or required by children within the child safety and youth justice systems
- independently monitoring the safety and wellbeing of all children residing in foster homes, residential facilities, detention centres and authorised mental health facilities through a program of regular visits and surveys and advocating on any systemic issues identified
- conducting and promoting research about the rights, interests and wellbeing of children
- monitoring and reviewing laws, policies and practices that impact on children and promoting action that upholds the principles underlying the Commission for Children and Young People and Child Guardian Act 2000
- maintaining Queensland's child death register and analysing and reporting on trends and chairing the Child Death Case Review Committee to review statutory child protection responses to children in the three years prior to their deaths
- administering the blue card system, including the daily monitoring of blue card holders.

The Commission's functions were borne out of, or strengthened by, Government's response to recommendations made in 1999 by Briton of the effectiveness of the Commission's enabling legislation, the 1999 'Forde Inquiry' and the 2004 Crime and Misconduct Commission Inquiry.

Key issues for the Commission's operations include: accommodating the increasing number of children requiring out-of-home care within its oversight scope; sustaining informed levels of compliance with the blue card system; and putting in place cost effective technological developments to increase the efficiency of its operations.

Continuing challenges faced by the child protection and youth justice systems include: comparative disadvantage being experienced by Indigenous children and young people; the need to improve outcomes for children and young people transitioning from care; and promoting inter-jurisdictional consistency and best practice on matters related to the safety and wellbeing of children.

RESOURCES AND PERFORMANCE

The Commission's priorities continue to evolve in response to the changing needs of children and system improvements. The percentage of the Commission's non-financial performance metrics meeting or exceeding target has steadily increased over the last three years.

During this time, the Commission has further strengthened and expanded its comprehensive evidence base on the current state of Queensland's child protection system. This unique evidence base has informed the 192 policy submissions undertaken by the Commission (53 in 2011-12) and enabled the introduction of a more flexible, risk based policy to visiting approximately 7,900 children in statutory care. Progressive development and expansion of the Commission's information management systems has vastly improved the Commission's capacity to share data on trends and thereby provide decision makers with access to accurate, contemporary reports about the key issues impacting on children.

Since 2009-10 the Commission has received over 859,000 blue card applications and authorisations for processing, with the number of blue card applicants and card holders monitored on a daily basis exceeding 517,000 in June 2012, an increase of more than 40,000 over the three years. Importantly, the safety of children in regulated service environments has been improved through the identification of nearly 2,200 cases (868 in 2011-12) where individuals were prevented from working with children. A survey mechanism has been introduced to establish levels of satisfaction with the broader range of blue card services provided by the Commission than just the initial application process e.g. support related to increasing general awareness, provision of specific information, assistance with the development of risk management strategies, compliance activities etc. Early data indicates that 93 per cent of those surveyed were satisfied with the services provided by the Commission.

The Commission's performance is also externally scrutinised through the public tabling and release of its reports, its strategic plan, the budget estimates hearing, and by a joint Parliamentary Committee. In 2012-13, the Commission's budget includes savings which will contribute to the State's fiscal repair task.

In 2012-13, in addition to continuing to deliver its core statutory functions, the Commission will:

- respond as required to the Queensland Child Protection Commission of Inquiry
- implement a new Child Death Register system to enhance its existing capability to capture and analyse risk factors in the lives of children who have died and provide improved access to eight years of trend data for policy makers and researchers
- improve the accessibility to health and wellbeing data produced in its annual Snapshot report by providing a free downloadable application to policy makers and the public
- strengthen its planning, information capture and reporting on its range of activities to improve outcomes for Indigenous children
- assess agency implementation of recommendations arising from the Commission's monitoring and investigation reports including the *Indigenous Child Placement Principle Audit Report* 2010-11 and advocate further where necessary
- continue to review the Commission's Community Visitor and blue card systems to identify opportunities for service efficiency without compromising the integrity and robustness of the existing processes

- complete development of a transitioning from care study that includes an exit interview for young people ageing out of care and explore a future follow up component
- commence a review of its monitoring plans with the Department of Justice and Attorney- General, Queensland Health, Queensland Police Service, Department of Education, Training and Employment and Department of Community Safety.

- 22. Increase in other current liabilities mainly due to recognition of a lease incentive liability relating to a lease incentive in 2008-09, not previously recognised in the financial statements.

- 23. Increase in other non-current liabilities mainly due to recognition of the non-current portion of a lease incentive liability relating to a lease incentive in 2008-09, not previously recognised in the financial statements.
- 24. Decrease in accumulated surplus due to a prior year adjustment recognising a deferred lease liability and expense relating to lease rental increases, partially offset by a 2011-12 year operating surplus.

Major variations between 2011-12 Budget and 2012-13 Estimate include:

- 25. Increase in property plant and equipment mainly due to capitalisation of leasehold improvements provided as a lease incentive in 2008-09, not previously recognised in the financial statements.
- 26. Increase in intangibles mainly due to capitalisation of expenditure incurred on the development of a child death register database and record management digitisation.
- 27. Decrease in payables mainly due to reduced level of trade creditors and grants payable at year end.
- 28. Increase in other current liabilities mainly due to recognition of a lease incentive liability relating to a lease incentive in 2008-09, and also a deferred lease liability, not previously recognised in the financial statements
- 29. Increase in other non-current liabilities mainly due to recognition of the non-current portion of a lease incentive liability relating to a lease incentive in 2008-09, not previously recognised in the financial statements.
- 30. Decrease in accumulated surplus due to a prior year adjustment recognising a deferred lease liability and expense relating to lease rental increases, partially offset by a 2011-12 year operating surplus.

Major variations between 2011-12 Estimated actual and 2012-13 Estimate include:

31. Decrease in property, plant and equipment mainly due to depreciation expense for the year.

Cash flow statement

Major variations between 2011-12 Budget and 2011-12 Estimated actual include:

- 32. Increase in grants and other contributions due to deferral of \$2.06M grant funding from 2010-11 to 2011-12 plus 50% reimbursement received for voluntary separation program payments.
- 33. Increase in other outflows mainly due to return of \$2.06M of 2010-11 deferred funding and \$2.4M of 2011-12 deferred funding in the 2011-12 year.
- 34. Increase in payments for property plant and equipment and intangibles mainly due to expenditure incurred on the development of employment screening and child death register databases.
- 35. Increase in cash at the beginning of the financial year mainly due to surplus grant funding at 2010-11 year end deferred to the following year and a decrease in receivables, partially offset by a decrease in estimated trade creditors at year end 2010-11.

Major variations between 2011-12 Budget and 2012-13 Estimate include:

- 36. Increase in grants and other contributions mainly due to additional funds for enterprise bargaining and funding for office accommodation rental increase.
- 37. Decrease in other inflows mainly due to a reduction in blue card revenue resulting from the transition from a two year to a three year blue card renewal period.
- 38. Decrease in supplies and services expenditure mainly due to the reduction in anticipated blue card processing costs (resulting from the transition from a two to a three year blue card renewal period).
- 39. Increase in payments for property, plant and equipment and intangibles mainly due to expenditure incurred on the development of a child death register database and record management digitisation.

Major variations between 2011-12 Estimated actual and 2012-13 Estimate include:

- 40. Decrease in other inflows mainly due to a reduction in blue card revenue resulting from the transition from a two year to a three year blue card renewal period.
- 41. Decrease in supplies and services expenditure mainly due to a reduction in anticipated blue card processing costs (resulting from the transition from a two to a three year blue card renewal period).
- 42. Decrease in other outflows mainly due to the return of \$2.06M of 2010-11 deferred funding and \$2.4M of 2011-12 deferred funding in the 2011-12 year.
- 43. Decrease in cash at the beginning of financial year mainly due to the return of \$2.4M of deferred funding in the 2011-12 year partially offset by an operating surplus for the 2011-12 year.



GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Accrual Accounting	 Recognition of economic events and other financial transactions involving revenue, expenses, assets, liabilities and equity as they occur and reporting in financial statements in the period to which they relate, rather than when a flow of cash occurs.
Administered Items	 Assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses an entity administers, without discretion, on behalf of the Government.
Agency/Entity	 Used generically to refer to the various organisational units within Government that deliver services or otherwise service Government objectives. The term can include departments, commercialised business units, statutory bodies or other organisations established by Executive decision.
Appropriation	 Funds issued by the Treasurer, under Parliamentary authority, to agencies during a financial year for: delivery of agreed services administered items adjustment of the Government's equity in agencies, including acquiring of capital.
Balance Sheet	 A financial statement that reports the assets, liabilities and equity of an entity as at a particular date.
Capital	 A term used to refer to an entity's stock of assets and the capital grants it makes to other agencies. Assets include property, plant and equipment, intangible items and inventories that an entity owns/controls and uses in the delivery of services.
Cash Flow Statement	 A financial statement reporting the cash inflows and outflows for an entity's operating, investing and financing activities in a particular period.
Controlled Items	 Assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses that are controlled by departments. These relate directly to the departmental operational objectives and arise at the discretion and direction of that department.
Depreciation	 The periodic allocation of the cost of physical assets, representing the amount of the asset consumed during a specified time.
Equity	 Equity is the residual interest in the assets of the entity after deduction of its liabilities. It usually comprises the entity's accumulated surpluses/losses, capital injections and any reserves.

Equity Injection -	 An increase in the investment of the Government in a public sector agency.
Financial - Statements	 Collective description of the Income Statement, the Balance Sheet and the Cash Flow Statement for an entity's controlled and administered activities.
Income Statement -	 A financial statement highlighting the accounting surplus or deficit of an entity. It provides an indication of whether the entity has sufficient revenue to meet expenses in the current year, including non-cash costs such as depreciation.
Outcomes	 Whole-of-government outcomes are intended to cover all dimensions of community well being. They express the current needs and future aspirations of communities, within a social, economic and environment context.
Own-Source Revenue	 Revenue that is generated by an agency, generally through the sale of goods and services, but it may also include some Commonwealth funding.
Priorities -	Key policy areas that will be the focus of Government activity.
Services -	 The actions or activities (including policy development) of an agency which contribute to the achievement of the agency's objectives.
