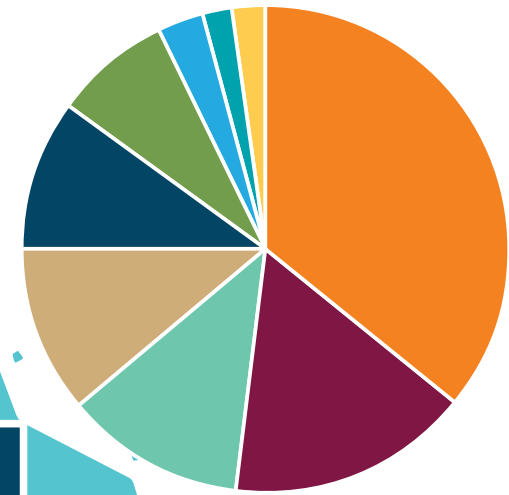

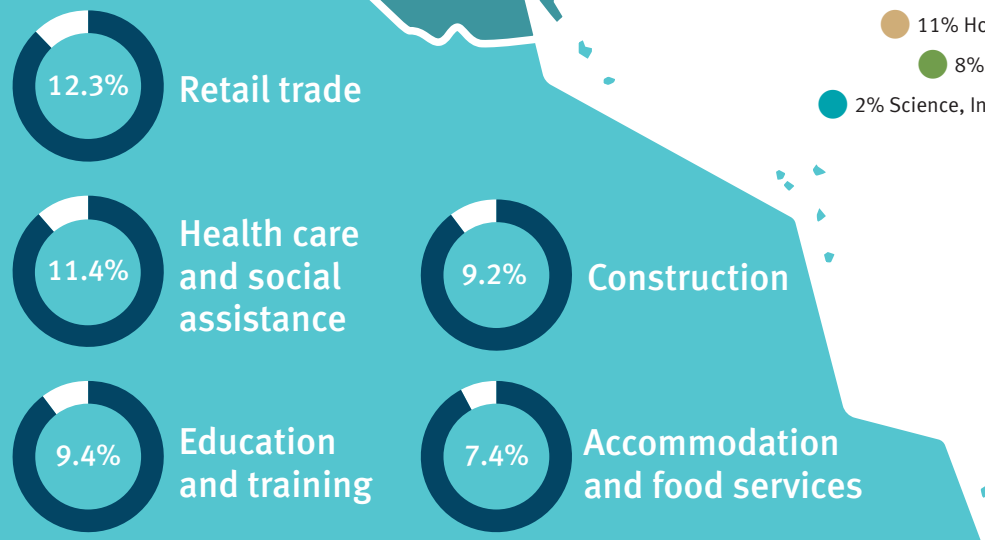

Jobs now, jobs for the future for Far North Queensland

The Far North Queensland region stretches from the Torres Strait Islands south to include the Cairns region. It comprises 19 local government areas and includes the major regional towns of Cairns, Innisfail, Weipa and Port Douglas.

Statewide Initiatives

- Drought relief**
\$45 million of \$52.1 million over four years for drought assistance and ongoing drought reform initiatives.
- Resilient communities**
\$40 million to establish the Community Resilience Fund to help local governments protect the infrastructure of communities vulnerable to natural disasters.
- Tourism and events**
\$128.3 million over four years to promote Queensland destinations and foster tourism growth. \$10 million of \$40 million over four years to promote events in Queensland.
- Aviation investment**
\$10 million over three years to attract aviation investment to promote Queensland destinations to international markets.
- Stolen wages**
\$21 million over three years in reparation for wages stolen from Indigenous workers, a legacy of past government practices.

- 1 Saving the Reef**
\$12.7 million of \$100 million over 5 years to protect the Great Barrier Reef through water quality initiatives, scientific research and transitioning to improved environmental practices in the primary production, mining and fishing industries. Includes \$10 million to buy back licences to establish three net-free fishing zones in north and central Queensland.

Far North Queensland Initiatives

- Social housing**
\$151.5 million to expand and improve social housing.
- Homelessness**
\$14.2 million for homelessness services.
- Disaster relief and recovery**
\$81.6 million, in partnership with the Australian Government, for local government recovery and reconstruction projects.
- Outback Way upgrade**
\$24.5 million over 2 years, in partnership with the Australian Government and local councils, to seal and upgrade sections of the Outback Way and other links.

- Backing Indigenous arts**
\$1.3 million for a network of Indigenous Art Centres and artists' access to space, training, education and enterprise development for artists.
- 2 Cape National Parks**
\$7.3 million over four years to provide for the continued employment of 15 Indigenous rangers to work across the protected area estate to ensure that parks are adequately managed and maintained. \$7.4 million over four years to manage approximately 2.6 million hectares of park estate on Cape York Peninsula. This includes the employment of seven additional rangers.

- 3 Tackling Panama disease**
\$9.8 million to tackle the Tropical Race 4 strain of Panama disease in partnership with the Australian Government.
- 4 Schools capital works**
\$13 million of \$33 million over three years for new classrooms.

- 5 Indigenous land and sea rangers**
\$4.8 million for the Queensland Indigenous Land and Sea Ranger Program to protect the region's environmental and Indigenous cultural heritage.

- 6 Cairns Convention Centre**
\$7.6 million over two years for roof and associated repairs to the Cairns Convention Centre.

- 7 Torres Strait major infrastructure**
\$14.6 million of \$41.2 million over six years, in partnership with the Australian Government, for infrastructure projects in the Torres Strait.

- 8 Mountain bike trails**
\$460,000 for mountain bike trails in the Smithfield Regional Park.

- 9 Sustainable agriculture**
\$1.7 million to target feral pigs, support sustainable grazing, tackle weeds and improve reef water quality in the Wet Tropics.

- 10 Cairns arts scene**
\$550,000 for exhibitions and performances at the Cairns Centre of Contemporary Arts.

- 11 Innisfail Wharf**
\$2.1 million towards the Innisfail Commercial Wharf in partnership with the Cassowary Coast Regional Council.
