

'BACK TO WORK'

\$100M to support up to **8,000 jobs** across regional Queensland

Employer support payments of up to \$10,000 to hire and keep a regional Queenslander employed for 12 months or more, including disadvantaged jobseekers such as mature aged workers, young people, members of drought affected farm households and other priority job seekers. Payments increase to \$15,000 for hiring long-term unemployed regional Queenslanders.

Eligible employees will also have access to job readiness payments to help them start their new job. This may include training, purchasing new equipment and uniforms or gaining or renewing trade licenses.

Bruce Highway duplication – Cooroy to Curra

The Queensland Government is investing \$245 million towards the duplication of the Bruce Highway (Cooroy to Curra) from Cooroy Southern Interchange to Sankeys Road (Section A). The total cost of this joint Queensland and Australian Government investment is \$490 million.


This project will deliver a new 13.5km, four-lane divided highway between the existing interchange south of Cooroy and the new section of highway in Federal (near Sankeys Road). It will also include a new all-movements interchange north of Cooroy and new bridges over Skyring Creek and Gardners Road.

This project is designed to meet the strategic transport needs of the Sunshine Coast and is among Queensland's highest priority road projects. It is expected to be completed by late-2016.



1 Paradise Dam improvements \$18.6 million in 2016-17 out of a \$22.8 million total spend on the

project to complete improvements.

2 Bruce Highway – Cooroy to Curra upgrade

\$84 million in 2016-17 out of a \$384.2 million total spend to construct a four-lane realignment of the highway from Traveston Road to Keefton Road, Gympie which is due for completion in June 2018. This project is undertaken in partnership with the Australian Government.

3 Cherbourg wastewater infrastructure upgrade

\$10 million in 2016-17 out of a \$15 million total spend to provide upgrades to the wastewater infrastructure.

4 Bundaberg gas pipeline project

\$9.8 million in 2016-17 out of an \$18 million total spend on the project in the Bundaberg Regional Council

5 Bruce Highway – Tiana overpass

\$28 million in 2016-17 out of a \$38 million total spend to upgrade the interchange in southern Maryborough, due for completion in May 2017. This project is undertaken in partnership with the Australian Government. 6 Monto – Mount Perry Road Burnett River Bridge replacement

\$7.4 million in 2016-17 out of an \$11.5 million total spend to replace the bridge and approaches at the river on the Monto - Mount Perry Road, due for completion in December 2016.

7 New Bundaberg Ambulance Station

\$3 million in 2016-17 out of a
\$5 million total spend to construct
a new ambulance station. It will be
collocated with a Queensland Fire and
Emergency Services facility to ensure
continuity of emergency services to the
local and surrounding communities,
including during periods of inclement
weather and natural disasters.

8 Kingaroy Police Station and Watchhouse

\$2.5 million in 2016-17 out of an \$8.3 million total spend to replace the station and watchhouse.

9 Burrum Heads Lions Park boat ramp and floating walkway

\$2.4 million in 2016-17 out of a \$5.1 million total spend to construct the Burrum Heads Lions Park boat ramp and floating walkway, due for completion in October 2016.



10 Kingaroy Courthouse

\$2 million in 2016-17 out of a \$4.2 million total spend to construct a new courtroom, install a lift and upgrade the fit-out to address sound attenuation and court operation issues.

11 New Rainbow Beach Ambulance Station

> \$1.4 million in 2016-17 out of a \$1.5 million total spend to construct a new station to meet the growing service demand in the region.



12 Tarong Pipeline

\$1.1 million in 2016-17 for refurbishment and enhancement of the Tarong pipeline.

\$1.1 million in 2016-17 out of a \$2.6 million total spend to replace the East Murgon Neighbourhood Centre which is not fit-for-purpose.

Bruce Highway –

\$5.1 million in 2016-17 out of a \$6.2 million total spend to widen a section of the highway at Dog Hole Creek, due for completion in July 2017. This project is undertaken in partnership with the Australian Government.

\$3.8 million in 2016-17 out of a \$5.8 million total spend to widen and overlay the highway south of Hervey Bay, due for completion in January 2017. This project is undertaken in partnership with the Australian Government.

\$748,900 in 2016-17 for enhanced allied health services.

18 Eidsvold water treatment facility

\$559,600 in 2016-17 out of a \$2 million total spend to assist North Burnett Regional Council to construct a new water treatment facility to replace the existing plant.

49 Abandoned Mine Lands
Program

\$500,000 in 2016-17 for managing sand mining legacy issues at Rainbow Beach.

\$282,000 in 2016-17 is allocated for the shaft repair program in Gympie to progressively makes the many historic gold mining shafts in the town safe.

20 Gympie Special School

\$490,000 in 2016-17 out of a \$7.8 million total spend to commence construction of a new administration block and additional classrooms.

21 Bruce Highway – Gympie to Maryborough, Bauple – Woolooga Road to Chapmans Road widening

> \$2.1 million in 2016-17 out of a \$3.1 million total spend to widen pavement, due for completion in November 2016. This project is undertaken in partnership with the Australian Government.

Childers Auxiliary Fire and Rescue Station replacement

\$400,000 in 2016-17 out of a \$2 million total spend to replace the station.

23 Nanango Police Station

\$314,000 in 2016-17 out of a \$2.7 million total spend to replace the station and upgrade the police residence.

Rainbow Beach Auxiliary Fire and Rescue Station

\$300,000 in 2016-17 out of a \$1.3 million total spend to replace the station.

Bruce Highway – Gympie to Maryborough, Arborten rest area exit to Deacons Creek widening

> \$1.1 million in 2016-17 out of a \$1.8 million total spend to widen the pavement, due for completion in November 2016. This project is undertaken in partnership with the Australian Government.

World Heritage extension to Fraser Island

\$209,000 in 2016-17 out of a \$373,000 total spend to progress the Great Sandy World Heritage nomination involving consultation with Traditional Owners, the public and the Australian Government by 30 January 2018.

Our Towns – Sustainable Centres Program Gunalda

> \$172,000 in 2016-17 out of a \$747,000 total spend jointly funded with Gympie Regional Council to complete streetscaping, footpath upgrades and formalisation of car and truck parking adjacent to the Gunalda commercial hub.

Fraser Island Ocean Lake facilities upgrade

\$164,000 in 2016-17 to replace toilet facilities (rota loos) with a more efficient and less labour-intensive sewage treatment system.

Mon Repos Turtle Centre redevelopment

\$3 million in 2016-17 out of a \$10 million total spend to redevelop the visitor centre and research facility.

Howard Police and Fire Station
